Zere's a little history about how our town newsletter came to be. It all started last winter when Tracy Hazen, a skilled graphic artist, identified the need for a community newsletter. At a Selectboard meeting last February she presented several examples of

ters (Tunbridge, Barnard, and Plainfield. NH) and also a prototype she had developed for a newsletter for Sharon, which she suggested could be called

tions". The Selectboard viewed this very favorably and was happy to support getting it started, agreeing to provide modest funding for printing and mailing the first two issues. Peter "Pano" Rodis spoke at the Town Meeting, proposing that because we could all benefit from strengthening communication with one another as neighbors, a sum of money be voted to hire someone for the purpose of developing town-wide communication. This sparked a lively discussion that ended in a "no" vote for funding a vaguely-defined position – but not for the concept of a newsletter. Town residents agreed with the sentiment but weren't ready to commit a line item in

the budget without having a clear plan in mind, and several residents volunteered to help work towards this goal.

A communications work group met soon after town meeting to think through the options available and further develop Tracy's newsletter proposal. These community volunteers have brought Tracy's

vision into reality, and the

concept she initially

presented to the Selectboard in February was issued as the first edition of the Sharon Connections Newsletter in June. Although some Sharon residents have internet access. many people don't,

and some of us just still prefer good, old-fashioned written words on paper. The newsletter working group elected to pursue a combination of the written and electronic forms and hence both the town newsletter and listserv have been launched

The Sharon Town Newsletter Committee is still a work in progress. We have included a masthead of our current membership and we would like to thank Pano Rodis. Mike Barsanti and Paul Haskell for their support in getting things started. If anyone is interested in becoming involved, please contact us as you are more than welcome (email Sharon Connections or call Miriam at 763-8268 ext 4). A draft town newsletter policy is available online at the town website SharonVT.net and in hard copy form at Town Hall. This gives a basic overview of how the committee operates and guidelines for the newsletter content and publication. Feedback is welcome!

SELECTBOARD BUZZ

Appreciations: The Selectboard once again would like to thank ALL the people who gave so much time, energy, food and money in the response to, and recovery from, Tropical Storm Irene. There has been such an outpouring of support from hundreds of people, both within Sharon and from afar, but in particular we would like to recognize the efforts of the core team who coordinated central aspects of this work: John Durkee, Carol Flint, Megan Calla, Steve Gagliardone, Gina Capossela, Jason Flint, Dana Durkee and the entire Sharon Fire Department, and Mary Russ. Their weeks of work behind the scenes was crucial to the community's ability to respond effectively to this event. These people volunteered their time day after day. taking significant time from their employment and other commitments to ensure that Sharon residents' needs were addressed and critical public infrastructure was repaired. A special thanks is also due to the Rodewald sisters and folks at the Vermont Independent School of the Arts who provided an extensive clothing and dry goods exchange.

FY13 Budget: The Selectboard office has been abuzz with FEMA activity for the past three months. Now that the initial recovery efforts from Tropical Storm Irene are winding down, the Selectboard is turning its attention to the next fis-

cal year's budget. Keeping a level budget will be out of reach, given the unanticipated expenses incurred as a result of the storm damage. This presents the Selectboard with an enormous challenge to find as many other places to cut back as possible. A public budget workshop will be held on Monday December 12th at 6:30pm at the Town Office. All members of the Sharon community are welcome to help shape this budget. The focus of budget workshops is to identify and prioritize community needs, strategize approaches to long-term funding for storm repairs, review all areas of municipal spending and prepare a budget to be presented to the town residents in the Town Report. The December 12th workshop will be the third public budget forum; more will be scheduled as needed to complete this work.

Increasing the Road Crew's

Capacity: In response to increasing demands on the three-person road crew, the Selectboard has added a fourth full-time road crew position and welcomes Sharon resident Nick Potter to the town roster. This new position will enhance the town's over-all efficiency in road and equipment maintenance and

will alleviate the task of advertising, hiring and training part-time temporary helpers for both summer mowing and winter plowing.

Road Repair Status: The road Crew and contractors have worked to repair or substantially stabilize all storm-damaged town roads to the extent time allowed before winter. This has been a tremendous effort on their part, and the Selectboard extends its most sincere appreciation for all their hard work. A new bridge is under construction on Fay Brook Rd because the previous structure was condemned due to the collapse of one wing wall and extensive "scour" beneath the bridge supports. Damaged bridges on Broad Brook Rd and White Brook Rd will be under design and engineering contracts over the winter for construction next year. Work on Rte 132 and River Rd will also be completed next summer.

Due to all the extra emergency repair work, the anticipated projects rebuilding a section of Beaver Meadow Rd and improving safety on the upper Quimby Mountain Bridge had to be postponed. These projects are substantially funded by state grants which allow the work to be completed next year.

SHARON ENERGY COMMITTEE

High Energy Weatherization Work!

The Sharon Energy Committee held a Weatherization and Energy Efficiency Workshop on Saturday, October 8th. Around 25 local residents attended all or part of the 3-hour workshop. Presentations were given by CVPS on Smart Meter technology. Smart meters are coming to CVPS customers in Sharon next summer. Efficiency Vermont provided information on appliance and lighting rebates and incentives, as well as home performance and weatherization incentives. Brent Mellon from Building Energy presented his findings from the energy audit of the Seven Stars building, and ReKnew Energy discussed solar photovoltaic and solar hot water technologies and incentives. Most attendees took advantage of the free weatherization supplies including window insulating film, pipe insulation, spray foam insulation, outlet cover insulation

and even rolls of fiberglass insulation. Congratulations to Jim Fisk winner of the Energy Committee's free home energy audit.

The Energy Committee's next goal is to get a warrant for voting at Town Meeting for the PACE (Property Assessed Clean Energy) program. PACE would allow Sharon homeowners to take low-interest loans to cover the up-front cost of approved weatherization or renewable energy projects. The most notable benefit of a PACE loan is that the loan is paid back to the town by payments on property tax bills and the loan stays with the property in the event of a home sale.

The Energy Committee encourages Sharon homeowners and businesses to save money and resources by weatherizing and conserving energy. If you would like to join us, the Energy Committee meets on the second Monday of each month at 5:15pm in the Sharon town offices. All are welcome.

LOOKING BACK...

The Great Flood of November 1927 and Hurricane Irene had a number of similarities. Both had too much rain, the White River went way over normal flood stage, roads and bridges and homes and businesses were destroyed. One

major difference is that no lives were lost in Sharon this time. In 1927, Mrs. Claude Reynolds and her two children were swept away in their house during the night of rising water. Neither the house nor the family was ever found. The Reynolds family lived where Lawrence "Tom" Paronto lived. The house in which Tom lived was built by the Red Cross after the flood for Mr. Reynolds and his son. According to the book Floodtide of 1927 written by Luther B Johnson, "the property losses included four occupied residences carried away entirely, one partially gone, five wrecked more or less completely. and four houses flooded so as to ruin the furniture on the ground floor."

In the 1927 flood, two businesses were destroyed. One was the Sharon Creamery which was located at the end of the present steel bridge over the river and the other was the Noyes and Gibson sawmill located between the river and what is now Stationmasters Rd. Ironically, two businesses were destroyed in this recent flood as well.

Hurricane Irene swept one garage away, destroyed nine manufactured homes and damaged two others. At least 17 houses had water in the basement or on the first floor. The Fire Station was flooded along with total losses at both Dixie's and Sandy's Restaurants.

As there was no way after the 1927 flood to gain access to the opposite sides of the river after the iron bridge and the railroad trestle south of town were swept away, a ferry was put into service after the river's ice melted in 1928. The ferry was nothing but a wooden raft and was pulled from one side of the river to the other by rope. The present steel bridge was built in 1928. Evidently, the bridge was built by the State of Vermont, as there is no mention of any cost to the Town in any of the Town Reports.

The 1928 Town Report does record that \$2,858.79 was paid for flood damage to the roads. Another \$3,539.98 was spent to build or repair four bridges. One interest-

ing expense was on Oct 18, 1928 Cheemauna Camp was paid \$25.65 for 171 loads of gravel at 15 cents/ yard. Wouldn't it be lovely if that were still the price! To date there has been more than ten times this amount used, at a price of more than ten dollars per yard.




SHARON ELEMENTARY SCHOOL NEWS



Native Americans call corn, squash and beans the Three Sisters. They grow well when planted together, allowing the corn to support the climbing bean plants while the sprawling squash plants shade the soil beneath the corn, keeping it cool and weed free. When eaten together, the Three Sisters provide complete nutrition and a hearty, satisfying meal. Corn, beans and squash are native to the Americas, as are the peppers, tomatoes, garlic and onions used to flavor them. Serves four.

2 Tbsp. corn oil
1 medium onion, chopped
1 small red or green pepper, chopped
2 cloves of garlic, chopped
1 cup broth or water
1 medium zucchini, halved lengthwise and cut into 1/2 inch slices

1-14.5 oz. can of beans: kidney, pinto, black, great northern, lima, or cannelloni, drained and rinsed.
1-14.5 oz. can of diced tomatoes, with juice
10 oz. package frozen corn kernels
1 tsp. chili powder (optional)

*serve with warm cornbread !

Heat oil over moderate heat in a large saucepan. Add onion and pepper and sauté until soft, about 5 minutes. Add garlic and cook 1 minute longer. Stir in broth, zucchini, beans, tomatoes, and corn. Add chili powder, if using. Raise the heat to high and bring the mixture to a boil. Reduce the heat, cover, and simmer for 10 minutes. Taste for salt and pepper and season to taste.

Salt and pepper to taste

THE BEST CORN BREAD WEVE

1 cup yellow corn meal
1 cup all purpose flour
1/4 cup sugar
4 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. Salt
1 cup of milk
1 egg
1/4 cup yeg. oil or melted butter



Preheat oven 425°.

Combine corn meal, flour, sugar, baking powder, and salt. Add milk, egg and oil. Beat until fairly smooth. Bake in 8-inch square baking pan, or pie pan or iron skillet (my favorite). First add oil to pan to coat all surfaces. Bake in oven 20 to 25 minutes.

This recipe used to be on the old Quaker cornmeal box 40 or 50 years ago.

CREAMY CHICKEN AND POLENTA CASSEROLE

Great for this time of year!

This recipe makes two casseroles. Keep one, and give the other to a friend, along with baking instructions.

Prep: 20 min. Cook: 36 min. Other: 10 min.

1 (32-oz.) container chicken broth

2 tbsp. butter or margarine

½ tsp. freshly ground black pepper

1 cup yellow cornmeal

³/₄ cup shredded parmesan cheese

1 (12-oz.) jar marinated quartered artichoke hearts, drained and coarsely chopped

1 (12-oz.) jar roasted red bell peppers (or your own), drained and chopped

4 cups shredded cooked chicken (about 1 large rotisserie chicken)

1 (16-oz.) jar roasted garlic Alfredo sauce (we tested with Classico)

1/3 cup chopped fresh basil

1½ cups (6 ozs.) shredded Italian cheese blend

Bring first 3 ingredients to a boil in a large saucepan; gradually whisk in cornmeal. Cook 4 minutes or until thickened and bubbly, stirring constantly. Remove from heat; stir in Parmesan cheese. Spoon polenta evenly into 2 (8") square disposable ovenproof pans (see note below). Cool 10 minutes. Sprinkle artichoke hearts, peppers, and chicken evenly over polenta. Pour Alfredo sauce over chicken in both pans. Sprinkle with basil; top with Italian cheese blend. Cover and chill until ready to bake. Before baking, place pan on center of a baking sheet. Bake, uncovered, at 350° for 25 minutes or until casserole is thoroughly heated. Yield: 2 casseroles (4 servings each). Can be frozen before cooking.

Note: We tested with Glad OvenWare disposable pans. Clip and save instructions from back or bottom panel, and share these instructions when gift giving.



UPDATE FROM THE SHARON FIREHOUSE RECONSTRUCTION CREW

We would like to thank all who supported the fire department and the town as we recover from Irene. Like many of our neighbors, the firehouse endured 7 ½ feet of water, and we lost everything on the first floor. Thankfully, we retrieved the trucks just in time and moved them to higher ground, but everything else was a complete loss. Good news followed weeks after Irene as we learned that the firehouse has flood insurance. This was good news as we continue to move forward with rebuilding. Your generosity is very much appreciated as we continue on with this arduous task

Good news is that the firehouse is getting closer to completion. New doors, windows, wiring are nearly complete, as well as new insulation and a new heating system. Sheet rock is in full progress and soon we'll be painting. We hope the firehouse will be ready to host a 180-hour Firefighter 1 course for all local departments beginning the first week of January and running



through the end of May.

Preventing Christmas Tree Fires:

A live Christmas tree can become fully engulfed in flames in mere seconds. Special fire safety precautions need to be taken when keeping a live tree in the house. A burning tree can rapidly fill a room with fire and deadly gases. Needles on fresh trees should be green and hard to pull back from the branches, and the needle should not break if the tree has been freshly cut. The trunk should be sticky to the touch. Old trees can be identified by bouncing the tree trunk on the ground. If many needles fall off, the tree has been cut too long, has probably dried out, and is a fire hazard.

Caring for Your Tree: Do not place your tree close to a heat source, including a fireplace or heat vent. The heat will dry out the tree, causing it to be more easily ignited by heat, flame or sparks. Be careful not to drop or flick cigarette ashes near a tree. Do not put your live tree up too early or leave it up for longer than two weeks. Keep the tree stand filled with water at all times.

Disposing of Your Tree: Never put tree branches or needles in a fireplace or woodburning stove.

When the tree becomes dry, discard it promptly. The best way to dispose of your tree is by taking it to a recycling center or having it hauled away by a community pick-up service.

Holiday Lights: Inspect holiday lights each year for frayed wires, bare spots, gaps in the insulation, broken or cracked sockets, and excessive kinking or wear before putting them up. Use only lighting listed by an approved testing laboratory. Do Not Overload Electrical Outlets. Do not link more than three light strands, unless the directions indicate it is safe. Connect strings of lights to an extension cord before plugging the cord into the outlet. Make sure to periodically check the wires - they should not be warm to the touch. Do Not Leave Holiday Lights on Unattended

Use Only Nonflammable
Decorations: All decorations
should be nonflammable or flameretardant and placed away from
heat vents. Never Put Wrapping
Paper in a Fireplace - It can result
in a very large fire, throwing off
dangerous sparks and embers and
may result in a chimney fire.
Artificial Christmas Trees If you are using a metallic or artificial tree, make sure it is flame retardant. Do not go near a Christmas
tree with an open flame - candles,
lighters or matches.

FINALLY... Be sure every level of your home has a working smoke alarm, and be sure to check and clean it on a monthly basis. Plan and practice a home escape plan with your family. Contact the Sharon Fire Department for advice if you have a question on home fire
