Welcome to the Town Meeting edition of the *Sharon Connections* newsletter, marking our fourth quarterly issue and wrapping up the first year of our town newsletter! Thank you again to everyone who submitted articles and photographs and donated their time and money to make this edition happen.

As we noted in previous issues, the town newsletter was established as a means to foster communication within the Sharon community, following a proposal that was raised during last year's Town Meeting. At that time, residents were hesitant to add a line item to the town budget to support a newsletter without a clear proposal. Since then, the Sharon Connections Committee was formed and has put together and distributed quarterly newsletters utilizing various funding and support strategies.

As we put together this fourth issue, we have a clearer understanding of the value a town newsletter offers the community, and a realistic budget based on experience. The Sharon Connections Committee now requests your input and support. Overall, your enthusiasm has been great, but ultimately we need to know whether the town is willing to support this endeavor in the years to come. The Committee is happy to volunteer our time to solicit, write, edit and compile articles and put them together in a newsletter format, and we

appreciate all who have taken the time to share their goings-on through our newsletter. Now it is up to you as Sharon taxpayers to decide if you want to support the printing and distribution of our town newsletter as a town-funded effort. Based on our experience with the first four quarterly issues, although folks seem to enjoy the Sharon Connections when it arrived in their mailboxes, and found it quite useful, distributing it through subscription and/or through purchase at the local stores, library and town office was unsuccessful. The cost to print and mail four copies to each home in Sharon will be \$2,400 per year for the four quarterly issues. This will be a cost of \$1.55 per year, per \$100,000 of value on a Sharon tax parcel; for an "average" Sharon home valued at \$200,000 that will cost \$3.10 per year. It is our sincere hope that you will support a motion during Town Meeting to have the town fund the printing and distribution and keep this town newsletter going!

THE MOST PERFECT CONGRESS IS IN SHARON

Like me, many of the people of Sharon will remember Charles Kuralt and his famous "On the Road" reports for CBS news. For years, Kuralt traveled the nation to take America's pulse on the values and aspirations that sustain the Republic. One March he came to a hill town in the White River Valley. Here he found something that later caused him to say that of all the places he had visited in America this was his favorite. What Kuralt found was town meeting.

No political institution in the history of America has received more praise than town meeting. Thomas Jefferson called it "the wisest invention ever devised by the wit of man for the perfect exercise of self government." Henry David Thoreau called it "the true Congress, the most respectable one ever assembled in the United States." James Bryce, in his classic The American Commonwealth (1912), wrote "the town meeting has been not only the source but the school of democracy." Even a leading scholar of the American city (Lewis Mumford) would say as late as 1961 that the failure of town meeting to extend past New England and to the rest of the country was "one of the tragic

oversights" of American political history.

All this should cause every citizen of a Vermont town, especially a small Vermont town, to smile deeply with pride.

What is it about TOWN MEETING that makes it the envy of all those everywhere who value democracy?

What is it about town meeting that makes it the envy of all those everywhere who value democracy? Democracy is for those who trust humanity. Town meeting is an expression of this trust. It is for all of us. We with the warts and prejudices and misconceptions. We of the callused palms and fat bellies, of straight ties and cardigan sweaters. We the young and we the old, flatlanders and woodchucks, in the black and in the red, farmer, lawyer, mechanic. We the people.

When I am asked to speak about town meeting around the state, I

urge citizens to beware the tyranny of perfection. For town meeting is us and we're not perfect. Those who shun their town meetings because they fear conflict or incivility should remember this: mistakes made by town meeting are a glorious affirmation of democracy's value. For real people practicing real democracy are bound to make mistakes – real ones. And at least with town meeting the failures are visible. Larger governments hide behind size and complexity and distance and detail.

At town meeting, we come face to face with our common humanity. By this and this only democracy is sustained.

The weeks leading up to Town Meeting are always a very busy time at the town offices, preparing various grant applications, getting the next fiscal year's budget finalized, and preparing reports for the Annual Report. This year the Selectboard has worked diligently to present a budget that, while higher than the current fiscal year's spending, is about even in expenditures with the budget in fiscal year 2011. This is quite an accomplishment, given the increase in prices of just about everything the town uses, the addition of a full-time staff member on the road crew, and the added expense of paying for the projected local share of highway repairs after Tropical Storm Irene.

One of the lessons learned through Sharon's experience in the flooding that followed this storm is that there is a serious need for more people to be involved in the community's Emergency Planning Committee. We are very fortunate in Sharon to have a superb team of emergency responders within the Fire Department, our "boots on the ground", but there remains a great need for active emergency planning and incident command team members. Training programs and classes are available at no cost to individuals interested in learning about Incident Command Systems and Emergency Operations Planning. We encourage anyone interested in getting involved in this critical area of community service to contact the Selectboard office as soon as possible.

There is an article on the warning for Town Meeting this year that may be new to most residents: the option for voters to designate Sharon as a Property Assessed Clean Energy (PACE) District. The Selectboard supports this article because the PACE designation would open opportunities for property owners to access low-interest loans for home improvements that increase the energy efficiency of their homes and lower energy costs. Eligible projects include improvements such as insulation or better windows to reduce heating costs, state-of-the-art heating systems to cut fuel use, or alternative energy systems like a solar electric installation. There is no cost to Sharon residents for this designation; only the property owner installing the improvements would incur a cost.

The purpose of the designation is to allow the property owner access to financing for their clean energy improvements as an assessment paid alongside their annual property taxes, such that the cost of these improvements travels with the property in the event of sale of the home. This eliminates the hesitation someone might have to invest in an energy improvement that may have a longer payback period than the homeowner thinks he or she might live in that home, allowing them to realize cost savings for whatever length of time they do live there, with the remainder of the cost of improvements passed to the next owner, who of course continues to realize the benefit of those improvements. The financing will all be done through a private nonprofit organization, the Vermont Energy Investment Corporation, known as Efficiency Vermont, under an appointment issued by the Vermont Public Service Board.

There are two new vehicles rolling down local highways bearing the inscription "Sharon" on their sides. The replacement dump truck that will be hauling sand and gravel and plowing the snow is a welcome addition to the town fleet, and the new ambulance responding to calls in Sharon from the South Royalton Rescue, now includes both "South Royalton" and "Sharon" on its sides.

Voters, or their family members, authorized persons, or health care providers may request early or absentee ballots for the articles to be voted on by Australian Ballot until 5:00PM February 29, 2012 by contacting the Town Clerk at 763-8268 ext 1. Voters wishing to vote by mail should request ballots early. The deadline for submitting voter applications for this annual meeting is February 29, 2012. The Town Clerk's Office is open that day from at least 3:00PM to 5:00PM for the receipt of voter application forms.

Article 1. To elect the following Town Officials by Australian Ballot:

Auditor for 3 years Collector of Delinquent Taxes for 1 year First Constable for 1 year Lister for 3 years Moderator for 1 year Second Constable for 1 year Town Clerk for 3 years Selectman for 3 years Article 2. To elect the following Town Officers:

Town Grand Juror – 1 year term Agent to Prosecute and Defend Suits – 1 year term Trustee of Public Funds – 3 year term Trustee of Baxter Library – 5 year term Trustee of Downer Fund – 3 year term

Article 3. To receive the reports of the Town Officers.

Article 4. Shall the voters of the Town of Sharon appropriate the amount of \$1,065,040 for necessary Town Expenses, including highways, and authorize the Selectboard to set a tax rate sufficient to provide the same?

Article 5. Shall the voters of the Town of Sharon authorize the Town Treasurer to collect the Town general and highway tax and the School District Tax on real and personal estate in two installments within the next fiscal year, the first being on or before (or by mail postmarked on or before) Tuesday, September 18, 2012 and the second being due on or before (or by mail postmarked on or before) Tuesday, February 19, 2013, with interest of one percent per month or part thereof for the first three months and one and one-half percent thereafter for each installment until paid in full, and a late fee of eight percent following any delinquency after the second installment due date?

Article 6. Shall the voters designate the Town of Sharon as a Property Assessed Clean Energy (PACE) District and authorize the Select Board to enter into an agreement with Efficiency Vermont to operate the PACE home energy improvements program for interested homeowners as provided by 24 VSA Chapter 8, Section 3261 et sea. such that only those property owners who have entered into written agreements with the municipality under section 3262 of this title would be subject to a special assessment, as set forth in section 3255 of this title?

Article 7. Shall the voters of the Town of Sharon request all of the following: (1) that the Vermont Congressional delegation and the US Congress propose a US Constitutional amendment for the states' consideration which provides that money is not speech, and that corporations are not persons under the U.S. Constitution, and that (2) the General Assembly of the State of Vermont pass a similar resolution, and that (3) the Town of Sharon send its resolution to Vermont State and Federal representatives within thirty (30) days of passage of this measure?

Article 8. Shall the voters of the Town of Sharon authorize the Selectboard to initiate a public process to investigate reclassification of Class III highways serving a very limited number of residences to Class IV highways?

Article 9. To transact any other business not of a binding nature.

NOTES FROM THE ENERGY COMMITTEE

The Energy Committee, with support from Representative Margaret Cheney, will be giving a presentation and answering questions regarding Property Assessed Clean Energy district (PACE) at the Town Meeting. This group will also be presenting an exciting proposal from the SunGen Sharon company that is currently installing a significant solar farm in Sharon at the industrial park. Through their generous sponsorship, Sharon has the opportunity to become the most "solarized" community per capita in Vermont by taking advantage of SunGen's offer to provide solar systems at less-than-market cost, and train local residents in techniques of installation and operation of solar systems. SunGen has also offered to provide a solar system for the town offices at no cost to taxpayers, and would like to locate a community-wide source of solar electricity on a south-facing site along Rte 14, River Rd, or Rte 132, to provide electricity at discounted rates to Sharon residents. In addition, they have offered to match 2:1 all funds raised by the elementary school to install a solar array to serve their electrical needs.

The Energy Committee is also promoting the Go Vermont program (www.connectingcommuters. org). Go Vermont is a web-based clearinghouse for all transportation modes in Vermont, featuring an automated carpool, vanpool and public transit matching service. information for state Park and Ride locations, and a link to "511" traffic conditions. The goal of the program is to increase carpools and vanpools to support efficient transportation choices. Transportation is the leading expenditure of energy and greenhouse gas emissions in Vermont. The Energy Committee supports Go Vermont in their effort to reduce the number of single-occupancy vehicles driven, in order to save all Vermonters energy, money, and our environment. Go Vermont materials will be available at Town Meeting. Please consider carpooling!

BAKED OATMEAL

Wonderful! Make this the night before and then bake in the morning for a perfect breakfast-brunch.

1/2 cup softened butter (1 stick)
1/4 cup white sugar
1/2 cup brown sugar
2 eggs
1 cup milk
1/2 to 1 tsp. cinnamon

1/2 tsp. salt
1 Tbs. baking powder
3 cups regular or quick cook oats
1/2 cup fresh or frozen blueberries
1 peach, skinned, chopped-no pit
2 Tbs. vanilla sugar or maple sugar or both

Beat together the butter and sugars. Mix in the eggs, milk, cinnamon, salt, baking powder and oats. Beat well. Add the fruit. Pour into a greased 8 inch square pan. Cover with foil and refrigerate overnight. In the morning, preheat oven to 350 degrees. Uncover pan and sprinkle with vanilla or maple sugar. Bake in preheated oven until firm, about 45 minutes. COTTAGE CHEESE – DILLY BREAD

Quick – Tasty – Keeps well!!!

20 minutes to prepare 35 – 45 minutes to bake Preheat oven to 350 degrees Butter an average loaf pan

- cup unbleached white flour
 cup whole wheat flour
 tsp. baking powder
 tsp baking soda
 tsp salt
 Tbs. fresh dill weed
 Tbs. onion flakes
- cup cottage cheese
 large beaten eggs
 Tbs. milk
 Tbs. honey
 Tbs. melted butter

1) Sift together dry ingredients

2) Beat together the wet ingredients. Add the dill and onion flakes with the wet. Gradually sift the dry into the wet, stirring and scraping the sides as you go. Don't beat – just mix enough to thoroughly blend. The batter will be quite stiff.

3) Spread it into the buttered pan (take your time) and bake it 35 - 45 minutes

SQUASH – KALE – HASH

Quick, Easy, Healthy and Delicious; What more can you ask for? Prep: 20 min. Cook: 36 min. Other: 10 min.

1 cup butternut squash, peeled, seeded, cut into large chunks
 1 cup kale, stemmed, chopped
 1 lb. Boneless, skinless chicken thighs, cut into 2" chunks salt and pepper
 1 Tbs. olive oil
 1 cup red onion, sliced
 1/2 cup dried cranberries
 1 Tbs. minced fresh sage
 1/2 cup chicken broth
 1/4 cup pure maple syrup
 1 Tbs. Dijon mustard

Blanch squash in a large pot with salted boiling water until almost cooked through, 3 - 4 minutes. Remove from heat, stir in kale and let stand, uncovered, for 3 minutes. Drain vegetables and set aside. Season chicken with salt and pepper.

Heat oil in the same pot over medium-high heat and sauté chicken until browned on all sides. Add the onion and sauté 2 minutes. Stir in the prepared squash and kale, cranberries and sage; sauté another minute.

Whisk broth, syrup and Dijon together; pour over the hash. Simmer until liquid reduces by half, about 2 - 3 minutes. Season with salt and pepper before serving.



SHARON ELEMENTARY SCHOOL NEWS

January marks the end of the second marking period - we're half way through the academic year! Our kids and staff are staying active and healthy by participating in many events. We have more than 30 children enrolled in alpine skiing and snowboarding at Ski Runners on Fridays in South Pomfret. Another 20 or so learn cross country skiing and snowshoeing here on our fields, as well as in Downer Forest. And during recess and after school you will see graceful skaters on our own town rink! With all these wonderful activities there are wonderful volunteers to keep it going. Parent chaperones take the bus to Ski Runners, Martha Cain and John Sears get the Nordic skis and boots ready and have several adult guides. We also thank the Fire Department (Rex Dyer and Tom Lober) for flooding the rink and making it smooth. Another way for our kids to keep active during the long winter months is the Passport to Winter Fun, a program designed by the Upper Valley Trails Association. The Passport program is an elementary school fitness program

designed to encourage children and their families to remain physically active during New England's long winter season. It emphasizes outdoor activities such as sledding, skiing, ice skating, snowshoeing, building snowmen or igloos, or just playing in the snow, but also includes indoor physical exercise. Participants track the days on which they have engaged in at least one hour of physical activity in a booklet resembling a travel passport, progressing through several levels of achievement when they have completed ten, twenty or thirty days of physical activity within the six-week program period. These achievement levels are milestones at which the children receive their choice of a healthy incentive prize.

As we welcomed in the New Year we also welcomed some new people to Sharon Elementary. Ben White is our new One Planet Site Coordinator and also our new Sharon Recreation Alliance Director. Tyler Benson: playing middle school boys basketball


