## Town of Sharon, Vermont **Planning Commission** Minutes April 20, 2021 (Final)

The meeting was publicly warned in conformance with H.681 authorizing temporary amendments to Vermont's open meeting law to protect the health and safety of the public, board members, and town employees during the state of emergency declared due to COVID-19. ## Ira Clark convened the meeting at 7:00PM.

Nomination of Meeting Chair:

### Ira Clark was named temporary meeting chair

#### Town Plan review, Energy Chapter:

Tory presented RPC maps illustrating topographically ideal sites for solar generation in Sharon, potential hydroelectric sites, and areas rated for wind turbine viability. Commissioners were also shown a GMP map indicating remaining capacity on power lines throughout the region. TRORC is not advocating biomass as a renewable energy solution owing to its atmospheric carbon production.

Planning Commissioners resumed discussion of the Energy Chapter, focusing on preferred siting for renewables and those areas discouraged from development. The group's consensus was that the document should guide development based on solid environmental, aesthetic, and grid-related criteria and not rely on designation of actual physical sites for new generation. Identification of specific sites in advance of real project proposals would inevitably be controversial with landowners and other interested residents, and existing commercial-scale solar generation appears to be ignoring mapped areas of high solar potential anyhow. Furthermore, many of the map-recommended sites are difficult to access from any road. Commissioners favor carefully crafting the guidelines on siting of projects and then evaluating each proposal on a case-by-case basis.

Commissioners discussed the viability of a 500kW size limit on commercial PV projects, methods to encourage dispersed development, proximity to roadways, and the drawbacks of remote location of solar projects. Standard verbiage on protected areas was reviewed. Limits on ridgeline development were discussed. Sue will look at Sharon's Telecommunications Bylaw to see what language it has with regard to high elevation facilities.

The Energy Chapter MS Word document is not allowing tracked changes. Ryan volunteered to reformat the document to permit collaborative editing. Tory will forward the file to Ryan and circulate it among members before the next SPC meeting.

Upcoming work on the Town Plan was discussed, covering the spring and summer months.

Dee Gish inquired as to the status of the junkyard ordinance that had been in discussion many months ago. Planning Commissioners believe the Sharon Select Board had been evaluating possible language. Commissioners are unclear where that work now stands, but can ask the Select Board.

## Administrative Business:
